
Happy Easter everyone!

Within Literacy this week, we started a new book, 'Pete the Cats, Easter Adventure'. The children have been tasting, smelling, touching, listening and looking at different story props that Pete experiences in the story, for example, painting easter eggs, tasting jellybeans, wearing bunny ears, nose and a tail (pictures below). The children have been matching pictures from the story and describing what is happening in some pictures. In mark making lessons, the children have continued to use their tripod grip to make a trail for Pete the Cat for his Easter Hunt. During cooking, we made Easter nests, following step by step instructions, mixing shredded wheat with melted chocolate, transferring it into their bowl and topping it up with mini eggs and then describing how it smells, looks, feels and tastes! The children thought it looked good and tasted yummy! In topic we have been using our senses and tasting and smelling the three different types of chocolate and commenting on it, the children were big fans of all the chocolate and was using the symbol 'more' a lot.

Within Phonics we have been working on the letter m, ensuring we know the difference between m and n, and we have also been identifying instruments and environmental sounds. In art, we have been making our easter cards, the children have decided whether they want to make a lamb, chick or a bunny, all the cards look great. Within PE, we have been doing a sensory circuit every morning, swimming lessons we have been completing competitions with Angela, moving floats with objects on them, swimming for a certain distance and collecting balls and throwing them through hoops, and in dance we have been dancing with Tigers!

Black Class

, Happy Friday everyone! It was great to have your parent consultations and share so many wonderful things with one another. This week we have started having some Easter fun. Our story for this week is 'Pete the Cats Big Easter Adventure.' The children loved trying on the bunny ears, exploring the sensory props and finding the eggs hidden around the classroom. As always, this followed with our comprehension work using symbols and some mark making/ writing practice.

In Numeracy this week we explored number. Some of us practiced counting to 5, 10 or 20, some of us practiced taking away from a group of objects and some of us practiced our division. Everyone worked really hard to complete their activities which was brilliant. I would like to make a special mention for Malachi who created his own maths game during outdoor learning time, using a dice, number mats and magnetic numbers.

Cooking this week was lots and lots of fun! We followed visual instructions to make Easter nests using melted chocolate, shredded wheat and chocolate mini eggs. These were a big hit and we have enjoyed eating them at snack time for the rest of the week.

During Topic this week, we used communication boards to comment on different chocolates and sweets including chocolate buttons, dark chocolate, jelly beans etc. We practiced commenting on what the items look and taste like. The milk chocolate buttons certainly got a 'yummy' from almost all of the children! To introduce this session we watched a clip from Charlie and the Chocolate Factory which Miley was very excited about!

We have also completed various other Easter activities including decorating eggs and Easter themed sensory play. We are all looking forward to our chocolate Easter egg hunt next week!
