Dear Parents and Carers



In literacy, pupils have been thrilled to explore the book 'Dear Zoo' together as a class. As we have several very capable readers, we added an animal riddle to each page to help pupils guess which animal we were about to reveal. The sensory story went down a storm on Monday and towards the end of the week pupils wrote some delightful letters of their own to the Zoo.



In maths we have been working on 'shape', tracing shapes in wet sand and matching to word mats. Most pupils have demonstrated that they are fully secure on basic shapes and are beginning to reach out to other 2D shapes such as 'oval' and 'hexagon'. Some pupils have extended beyond this to think about 3D shapes as well.

Pupils took part in P.E. sessions, hurdling, jumping and running the length of the track on the field. PSHE went well with all pupils matching real faces to happy and sad emotion symbols and some reaching onwards to more complex emotions such as excited, scared, angry and tired.

Students are really starting to recognise their coins through the math games and individual targets and some students were able to buy their chosen item at OXSRAD all by themselves this week. Chan bought some GF crisps and found her £1 coin all by herself! Sam was so keen to match his coins in the money game he had a few cheats! Cheeky Sam!

We recapped on PRIDE as this is PRIDE month and students produced some beautiful rainbows and PRIDE posters to display around class and school. A particular well done to Ben who persevered with his PRIDE poster even though Leah suggested many changes. He was proud of his achievement as was Leah! Josh and Gill painted one together with Josh being the director of course! The AoPE Group have carried on with their individual project work, all using laptops by themselves this week with Leah just helping a little when help was needed. Students also practised counting to 10 in French!

Orange Class

We have gone crazy for caterpillars in Orange Class this week! We read all about them in the information text that we have shared in Literacy, finding out that they eat the egg that they hatch from and then eat the leaf they find themselves living on. Caterpillars really are very hungry! We made 'caterpillars' by threading cotton reels onto a lace, practising our fine motor skills. Some of us took the opportunity to count how many reels we had threaded.







The children have also made caterpillars from egg boxes, following simple step by step instructions and choosing the colour of our paint. We added antennae and eyes for good measure. We also used paint to print caterpillars with our feet (that explains the green and red toes!)

Red Class

We hope that you were impressed with the children's newsletter articles last week. Didn't they do well? We are hoping that they will be able to do another one soon, so keep looking out for their next newsletter.

We have had a very exciting week in Red Class. Because of the beautiful weather our butterflies emerged from their cocoons very quickly. The children really enjoyed releasing them in the school grounds. It was particularly exciting because they didn't fly away immediately which meant we got time to hold them on our fingers and study them really carefully.

The class snails: Tommy and Maxi, are very healthy and growing quickly. The smaller one; Maxi has almost doubled in size. They are still quite shy and we don't often see them much during the day.

As our topic is animals this term we have been learning about some of the wild animals in the world. Where they come from, what they like to eat and how they find their food. The children have really enjoyed this activity. First they chose an animal picture. Next, they wrote down everything that they already knew about that animal. Then they wrote lots of questions about their animal down. Finally, they used books and Ipads to find the answers to the questions. We have been working hard on only using information that we can read and understand to write on our animal posters.

In maths this week we have been learning all about fractions. Our focus has been on halves and quarters. The children really enjoyed cutting biscuits, cakes and chocolate into halves and quarters and then eating them after the lesson. They became really good at making sure that the halves they were sharing with each other were very equal. Perhaps, if you are having cakes or biscuits at home you could get them to show you how to cut them in half.

Gold Class

In literacy this week we have done some more work around the narrative poem *The Owl and The Pussycat*. We used the story maps from last week to recite the poem and one group used stick puppets to perform the poem from their story maps. It was a lovely performance which they put their own twist on – well done! The others in the class wrote a summary of the characters and main events in the poem.





We have had productive maths lessons this week. Freya and William did brilliant work with coins and understanding their value; Ryan Thomas used money to pay for items in a role play shop with a small group of students and some students were focussed on multiplication this week using mental and written methods.







In topic lessons on animal lifecycles, we have looked at the life cycle of a bird and compared that to insects and amphibians. Students were able to explain the stages in the lifecycle and draw it carefully with labels. We have also learnt about the life cycle of a green turtle and talked about all of the problems that turtles have to survive. We then had a lesson on how to draw a turtle resulting in some amazing pencil drawings. The weather is a bit unpredictable right now, so sun hats and sun cream and raincoats are a good idea just in case. P.E as always is on a Monday and Wednesday and so P.E kits must be in school on those days.

Some of us traced animals, some of us drew animals with visual support and we all used symbols to match adjectives to pictures.

In Numeracy this week we began to explore patterns and symmetry. We used toys and props to continue repeating patterns. We then used communication boards to describe the repeating pattern in terms of shape, size and colour. Everyone worked very hard!











In Cooking this week, we practiced our mashing skills. We followed visual instructions to mash banana and spread it on toast. I cannot say it was as big a hit as the ice creams that we made previously! In messy play and topic this week we have continued to explore animals. We pretended we were zookeepers and washed all the muddy animals in our big sensory tray using brushes. We also matched and sorted zoo animals into different categories.
