Dear Parents and Carers

We are racing to the end of the school year and it is very busy as usual. Pupils have been challenged to swim distance, Congratulations to all of them, in particular Hayden and Holly who both managed to achieve 200m.

You will find your child's report has been sent home this evening in preparation for the parent meetings next week. They are also being emailed to you today. Please take the opportunity to read them so you can raise any questions you may have next week. At the meeting the teachers will also be sharing Positive Behaviour Management Plans with you if your child has one in place. This is an opportunity to discuss possible triggers for behaviour and will enable teachers to get an insight into how you best manager behaviour at home. Working together is key to the success of each individual pupil.

As mentioned in previous correspondence, parent consultation is also where you will find out which class your child will be in next year. We have had guite a high turnover of pupils this year as some pupils are moving out of Oxfordshire, which has resulted in quite an overhaul of our classes for next year. We will let you know next week which class your child is in and who the teacher is likely to be. There is always a chance this can change due to unforeseen circumstances. As in previous years we are not able to share information of other pupils who will be in your child's class due to GDPR regulations, although I am sure you will make contact with each other via our Facebook site. Can I take this opportunity to explain that although we have 11 classes across the school there are 3 classes per pathway. This means that pupils don't necessarily change classes each year as they would in other schools. They will sometimes move 'back' into a 'class name' that they have been in before. This is due to the teachers evaluating exactly what stage a pupil is at and then we will move pupils into the most appropriate class. As we group our pupils by individual need and ability, they may move backwards and forwards across the classes. Please be assured that this doesn't mean they are repeating a year or will not be able to make good progress. This is about ensuring the pupil is in the right class, with the right teacher and peers in order to make the best possible progress against their long-term outcomes stated on their EHCP, as well as their Maths and English Targets. We also consider during the academic year whether a pupil is in the best place possible, therefore moves across classes within the year also take place.

Following a successful interview, Charlotte Lee will be leaving us in September to start a new job at another school. Whilst we are sad to see her depart, we wish her every success in her new career. We have already completed the interview process and I am pleased to say that Heather Short will be joining our team.



It shows how our topic work encompasses elements of science, art, DT, literacy and maths through lots of different activities during a term. The children love to look at their own work and spot the things that they have made and it prompts them to talk about their learning.



Our 'butterfly' activities this week have included making symmetrical butterfly patterns using paint. We represented the life cycle of the butterfly using different pasta shapes and a bean as an egg sitting on a leaf. Some children matched up two halves to make a complete butterfly – again, exploring symmetry.



### **Gold Class**

It has been a lovely week. We have been learning more about animal life cycles this week and we are beginning to make some comparisons between different types of animals and their life cycles. We have noticed that both amphibians and insects go through a change in their life cycle and that insects, amphibians, reptiles and birds begin the cycle as eggs. We really enjoyed watching a video of a Blue Tit nesting box and how the male and female birds busily built the nest and looked after the young birds before they were able to fly. We were interested to learn about the life cycle of turtles and enjoyed playing a life cycle game about turtles. Ask us what we know about turtles and where they lay their eggs.





In literacy, we have been working with The Owl and the Pussycat and have picked out the rhyming words. Some pupils have written a new verse using repetition and rhyme. At swimming today, they all swam brilliantly and amazed us all by the distance that they could swim! All pupils swam between 50 m and 200 m. Holly and Hayden both achieved 200m today.







Today we say "Goodbye" to Gabe, who is moving house and will be starting at a new school. We had a lovely afternoon playing games as a class. We will miss him and wish him well in his new home and school.


### **Silver Class**
