Hello everyone, happy Friday. It's been a lovely week with pupils in Blue Class this week. Both children (and staff!) have presented as really relaxed and engaged as they have tucked into the range of activities that we have had on offer.

One of the highlights of the week was our sensory play. Pupils really enjoyed finding insects and bugs in compost, getting nice and messy. In-between this, staff encouraged pupils to go bug hunting under logs and rocks in the forest school's area and other pupils even had an

opportunity to go on the outside trampoline.

In literacy, in keeping with our other activities, we were reading 'The Very Ugly Bug'. Pupils loved dressing up as the characters, with green silks like the smooth green bug, goggles like the red bug and wings like the fast, blue bug. Our mark making and sentence construction was also a hit accordingly.

In maths we have been working on sequences. All pupils have evidenced that they can independently continue two colour sequences with some extending to three and four colours whilst others have been working on number patterns and repeated additions.

Swimming went well on Tuesday with pupils making excellent progress,

one particular young man managed his first ever independent length! In topic we have continued to match emotions to real faces.

It's been fantastic, settled weather for the most part this week and it has been brilliant to spend time out and about with your young people. Have a super weekend and we will see you all again on Monday,

For Topic work this week we focussed on habitats and where creatures are found and why (including adaptation). Students engaged in trying to match creatures to their specific habitats and some students looked more deeply into the eco system and studied woodland pictures to find all the different creatures and plants that are part of that cycle. It is amazing to discover how many actual creatures and plants can be found in one simple area. We have continued with recapping some French words and students are exhibiting their new language skills – amazing! Alicia can almost count to 10 in French by herself. Roberto occasionally slips in a 'Buongiorno'.

Students engaged with the planning process of deciding what they would like for their picnic lunch on our walk for Friday as part of the DoE Award and had a go a preparing their own picnic roll on the Friday. Most Students participated in their DoE (Duke of Edinburgh) Award on Thursday and Friday and as you will see from the pictures, they had an enjoyable time out walking in the fresh air in the beautiful local countryside.

They chose their favourite animal, printed a picture from Google Images and then wrote down lots of facts that they knew already. The final challenge was to use books and the internet to find some new and interesting facts about their animal. I was so pleased with their writing and concentration, well done everybody.

We have been learning about capacity again in maths. The children really enjoy pouring and scooping various substances into different containers and deciding whether it is 'too big' or 'too small' or 'just right'. We have also been making lots of patterns in maths. We sometimes find this quite tricky so if you get the chance to make pictures or patterns using repeating shapes or colours at home that would be great.

During the European Football tournament, we have been experiencing snacks and treats from other countries. Last Friday the children made 'Fairy Bread'. This treat is from Holland. They spread butter or chocolate spread on some sliced bread with no crusts and then cover it in lots of sprinkles before they eat it. As you can imagine this was a very popular snack.

We have been learning how to tell the time on analogue clocks this week. We are getting better, and some pupils can confidently tell the time to 5 minutes. A few need to practise this regularly at home – beginning with O'clock, half past and quarter to or past the hour. The more they practise, the more confident they will become. Black Class

Black Class have been hard at work this week! We started our new topic and have been exploring minibeasts. Our story for the week has been 'The Very Ugly Bug.' We all enjoyed exploring the sensory props for the story, especially trying on the wings and mask! We dug in soil to find different insects which some of us found a little bit scary! I would like to make a special mention for Malachi who explored a non fiction textbook and found the insect in the tray to match! We continued to work on our recognition of adjectives to describe a range of insects. We used words 'spotty, stripy and hairy' very well in the activity! In Art this week, we made ladybirds using a range of different materials. We counted out black spots to put on to our ladybirds too!



Numeracy this week we have been learning about shapes. Some of us have been finding a specific shape on request whilst some of us have been linking two key words to find more specific shapes. E.g. big circle/ red triangle etc. Some of us also practiced counting the sides of shapes and sorting them accordingly.

I would like to make a special mention this week for Eleonora who swam a length of the swimming pool independently!
