On Monday afternoon, the children had a great time during our P.E session in the Big Hall. We focussed on rolling balls onto different surfaces and watching them go up and down. Our students were amazing at waiting their turn and rolling the balls back to their friends or to adults. Singing with our friends from Trinity Church of Abingdon and Pink Class is always a favourite thing to do on a Tuesday morning. Gold Class

Good afternoon and welcome to another fab Friday! Is it raining? Is it sunny? We're just not quite sure... but given how excited we all are outside, we definitely know it's windy! This week has been busy but positive. World Book Day on Thursday saw the spontaneous arrival of 5 Harry Potter Characters in class without any prior arrangement or planning! If anyone can explain this phenomenon then please do let us know!

In literacy this week, we continued to create captions for images, however this week we have focused on facts and information in the style of a newspaper rather than advertising captions. By Thursday, all

children wrote a caption for a picture of themselves with relative independence.

In maths we have been discussing methods for estimating amounts (counting, grouping and multiplying if the objects to be counted are in a grid). Towards the end of the week, we also introduced '100 number squares' for higher addition and subtraction for most pupils. They have explored how we can

count up and down in ones or

in tens using the square.

In Science we have investigated bones, discovering that they are used for support, protection and movement. We then named some bones by playing 'the Expert Challenge'.

All pupils in Gold have continued to make excellent progress with their swimming and may have even made it home with a mini pizza quiche after D&T!

White Class

We always built lots of physical activity in to each day. This could be in the form of PE, movement breaks, swimming, cycling, ballpool, sensory circuit or morning shakeouts. The focus in PE this term continues to be dance with our external coach. The children have enjoyed responding to the music and whizzing round the Big Hall.



Every morning we follow a set routine where we say, sign or tap on a drum to say good morning. We then talk about what day of the week it is so that the children understand about the passing of time. Looking out of the window to check the weather follows that and we practice signing 'rainy', 'sunny', 'icy', 'foggy' and 'cloudy'. We are getting good at signing 'sunny' in particular. The good morning routine is rounded off with a physical shakeout and the children are getting much better at standing up and copying the movements from the video clip on the whiteboard and from the adults.
