

In maths we have continued to look at estimating as well as thinking about the vocabulary 'one and lots'. We have been doing this in structured teaching sessions as well as in role play using rice to make different recipes.

In topic we have continued to think about how our body works. We have been looking at how food travels through the body, the different parts of our body we use to eat and the different parts of our body food travels through. Thinking about our bodies has also led to us doing some healthy baking in cooking. This week we made some healthy flapjacks. We have also enjoyed our doctor role play sessions where we have been looking after patients and writing doctors notes.

Finally we would like to say how proud we were of all the children at our climbing session last week. All of the children were really brave whether it was just putting the harness on, climbing a bit on the wall or climbing all the way to the top.

Some of us have even been learning to use a 2- or 3- circle Venn diagram to sort within overlapping categories. In art we have come to the end of using clay, and have a collection of items which we will paint all together next week. (We also hope your mothers' day cards made it safely home!)

Finally, we hope to see many of you next Wednesday afternoon to share a cluster assembly with us and view some of your child's achievements from this term.

Gold Class

Happy Friday All. I trust you've enjoyed the arrival of... summer? We've certainly been enjoying the good weather and sunshine here in Gold Class and have even scraped together time at the end of a couple of school-days to spend fifteen minutes extra on the field playing or engaging with teambuilding challenges.



In literacy this week we have evaluated and improved a factual text, reminding ourselves about capital letters, full stops and other punctuation such as commas in lists. Through this, we also discussed and explored the difference between fact and opinion, the latter of which is banned in factual writing!

As we mentioned last week, we have been exploring fractions of amounts in maths this week. This has proved to be a tricky topic for pupils but we have supported it with visual and physical resources.



Pupils split an appropriate amount of cubes into the different segments of a circle representing a fraction and found the answer to these questions accordingly.

In D&T this week we have created a healthier pasta option with herbs, veg, tinned tomatoes and tuna. Pupils enjoyed trying this back in class while it was still warm.

On Wednesday we were fortunate enough to be given the opportunity to visit Trinity Church in Abingdon where we took part in their 'Easter Experience', exploring the story of Easter in the Christian Faith. We followed this up with some work in school and will be comparing Easter to other famous celebrations from different religions in our lessons next week.

With just one week until the Easter holiday, it promises to be pretty action packed.

Homework

Please explore the concept of fact and opinion with your child as this proved to be tricky for several pupils this week. Challenge them to interpret between examples of both and then create their own fact and opinion statements. Please promote fluency with the basic mathematical language for fractions in different scenarios - particularly for halves, thirds and quarters. You might for example want to fairly lay some coins out on a table, work together to find their total worth and then split the amount into two fair halves. This could be made simpler by ignoring money and splitting objects fairly, or more complex by using a mix of coinage.






News from Winter Cluster

The children were also fascinated by the slideshow of themselves and their classmates. This is part of our topic about growing and the children were very good at guessing who was who by looking at pictures of themselves and their classmates when they were much younger.

Some of the children have used informal methods for measuring by drawing round one another and then measuring the outlines with string. Everyone is tall, but some children are taller. We have one child who is the tallest! Other children got busy measuring our rapidly growing sunflower plants with small cubes and then recording the results by writing the number of cubes down. Other children have focused on their numbers this week and have enjoyed throwing and counting balls and cubes.
